

University Studies 1 Ace the UCLA College-to-Career Transition

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Course Description

University Studies 1 is a 6-week summer session asynchronous online 1-unit course open to continuing UCLA students. The objectives of the course are to introduce students to the value of a research institution, its transferable skills, and how they can most effectively maximize their time at UCLA to prepare them for the College-to-Career transition. It will give students the opportunity to reflect upon what they have accomplished both inside and outside of the classroom and how they may market the skills and strengths they have cultivated. The course will feature modules highlighting the transferable skills they may acquire through coursework and co-curricular high impact practices; how to foster meaningful relationships with their diverse community of scholars; to demonstrate awareness of career readiness competencies; how to assess their values, skills, interests, and strengths; and how to navigate the College-to-Career transition.

Students must complete each module to proceed to the next one. They will be required to complete a quiz and submit a self-reflection before they may proceed to the subsequent module.

Students will have opportunities to engage with the instructor and their peers through discussion boards at least 3 times during the 6-week session. There will also be 2 live sessions with the instructor and a Career Center content expert to answer student questions and to provide live feedback. Students will be invited to a social event at the Career Center to foster connection and resource utilization at the end of the summer session.

Learning Outcomes

- Express the value of a research 1 institution, including its transferable skills.
- Identify university campus resources and describe their services.
- Demonstrate how to approach undergraduate education with intention.
- Reframe and express the relationship between majors, transferable skills, and career.
- Demonstrate awareness of career readiness competencies.

- Identify the dimensions of the College-to-Career Transition.
- Assess academic growth, and personal and professional development through self-reflection.

Grade Calculation

This course is 1 unit. Pass/No pass grading only. Students need to earn at least 73% in the course to earn a Passing grade.

Quizzes (30%)

There will be 6 guizzes, 1 for each module.

Self-Reflection Assignments (50%)

Self-reflection is the act of thinking for an extended period by and reflecting upon experiences to learn from them. Self-Reflections must be at least one-page, double-spaced, typed, and uploaded to Bruin Learn.

Final project/personal action plan and letter to your future self (20%)

Description of Modules

Module 1

The Bruin Community and Overview of Course

Module 1 will feature short lecture videos that prompt students to reflect upon how they have transitioned into a research university and how they have navigated their transition by embracing both challenges and opportunities for growth. This module will highlight the connection between "sense of belonging" (Strayhorn) and student learning and engagement. Moreover, it will demonstrate the value and goals of the course, provide an overview of the themes and student learning outcomes, and will outline the course requirements.

Module 2

The Value of a Research 1 University

Module 2 will feature video lecture presentations that demonstrate what it means to attend a highly selective and rigorous R1 institution, including its opportunities and value. In addition, it will highlight the transferable skills obtained by attending a research institution, whether or not they pursue formal research opportunities.

Module 3

Intentional Engagement in Curricular and Co-curricular Opportunities

Module 3 will feature short lecture videos that introduce students to curricular and co-curricular opportunities at UCLA and will invite students to consider what meaningful engagement looks like for them as individuals, with the goal of fostering more intentional engagement with the university. This module will also highlight the importance of meaning making and drawing connections between what they learn inside and outside of the classroom, and how they may market transferable skills.

Module 4

The Relationship between the Major, Self, & Career

Module 4 will feature short lecture videos that highlight the ways in which students effectively partner with academic advisors to pursue a major or course of study. It will debunk the myth that a specific major will directly correlate to a specific career path and demonstrate the transferable skills students may obtain in any UCLA major. This module will also introduce students to the Career Center and the career education process.

Module 5 will feature short lecture videos that focus on career readiness competencies and invite students to reflect upon their values, skills, interests, and personality. This module will feature how the Career Center may support them during their time at UCLA to prepare them for their next chapters.
